## VDI scale for reporting an odour complaint.

Feedback or Odour complaints can be reported to Redvale Landfill through three different methods,


- 1. Email redvalecomplaints@wm.nz
- 2. Phone call 09 427 0600 or 021 190 2018
- 3. Text message 021 190 2018

To work with us, please provide constructive feedback only, which includes the following information,

- 1. Time and location of the odour
- 2. Type of the odour
- 3. Character and intensity of the odour
- 4. Frequency of the odour how often it occurs, duration of the odour and time of exposure.

VDI scale example below on how to classify odour intensity.

## **Odour Intensity**



Odour Intensity: The perceived strength of an odour above its threshold. It is determined by an odour panel and is described in categories that progress from "Not perceptible"; "Very Weak"; "Weak"; "Distinct", "Strong", "Very Strong", to "Extremely Strong".

The best way of assessing odour is via the human nose. But everyone reacts to odours differently. One person may object strongly to an odour while another is not bothered by it. The only objective method to assess odours is a calibrated nose that has completed Olfactometric measurement.

## Dear readers,

This is the third newsletter for this year, and seven months of the year have passed. I am writing this newsletter on the last day of July, and we have been promised two meteor showers tonight. I am hoping that there will be limited or no cloud cover, especially as the first shower is expected between 9 and 11 p.m. and the moon will only rise after midnight, meaning a fairly dark sky.

In early May, my family and I had the good fortune to see the Aurora Australis from our deck on Blackbridge Road and seeing it as far north as Auckland is apparently quite a rare phenomenon. It was stunning, lighting up the southern sky with a red hue, and in the early part of the show, there were about eight silver-white shafts reaching from the horizon and heading skyward. Later in the evening, tinges of green emerged below the red hue.

Later in May, we had a spectacular electrical storm, with flashes of lightning followed by pretty close thunder, accompanied by heavy rain and strong winds. I heard one particularly loud crash and thought it was thunder. Just before sunset, the rain had stopped, and I went out to put our chooks into the chookhouse and then noticed our garden shed had blown away, leapfrogging two fences, and settling in a manuka thicket about 8 metres from its origin. We also lost four large older Kanuka trees—enough firewood for next year's winter.

And then, this month, we have had plenty of rain, especially from mid-month onwards.

On the global front, we won our first gold at the Olympics overnight (Women's Sevens), and there could be a few more medals, specifically in rowing. Sadly, the Russo-Ukrainian war is still dragging on, and the Israeli conflict also does not seem to have an easy solution in sight.

Our next Community Liaison Committee meeting is scheduled for **6.30 p.m. on August 12th**. A reminder to all readers that these meetings are open to the public. If you intend to attend, please let Waste Management know so that additional seating can be arranged.

On the environmental front, readers may wish to visit the Green Park Reserve (off Green Road) and have a gander. Those wishing to find out more about how to get involved can contact Auckland Council to find out about tree planting, etc. Also on this theme, there is an initiative to make Dairy Flat pest-free, copying what the folk at Coatesville have managed to achieve. If we can make our area pest-free, this will be good for the Green Park Reserve, as it would have very few pests getting through to it, and the park could play a vital link in the Nor-West Wild Link, joining Tiri Tiri to the Waitakere Regional Park.

In closing, I again appeal to all readers to please support the advertisers promoting their services in this newsletter. Locals supporting locals is always a good thing!

## **Background**

When humans arrived in New Zealand, we unfortunately brought various pets and pests, which have disastrously impacted many native species. NZ was once entirely free of warm-blooded predators like rats, so birds evolved with little or no ability to fly, making them easy prey for the predators we introduced. As a result, many bird species have already become extinct. In fact, today, New Zealand has one of the worst extinction records of any country. It's our obligation to save the remaining native birds, frogs, lizards and plant species and help re-establish them across NZ.

In 2015, the government announced the Predator Free 2050 program (PF2050) with the goal of eliminating all mustelids (stoats, weasels, ferrets, etc.), rats, mice, and possums in New Zealand. It's a HUGE challenge that requires every New Zealander to contribute. This is probably the biggest community project.

## Why have we established PFDF?

Most people understand the purpose of PF2050, but like many good ideas, it requires joined effort. We are all passionate and doing our own predator control efforts, but we quickly found when we started that our particular areas were not covered or supported by other Pest Free groups. That is why we decided to create a local group that fills the gap in the centre between Restore Rodney East and West. It needs us all to take responsibility for our environment, roll up our sleeves and tackle the issue as a community. A lot of good progress has been made across the country.

And you don't need to look far. Our good friends at Pest Free Coatesville are doing a fabulous job at reducing pest numbers. Thanks to their hard work there are numerous sightings of Kaka in the area. There are Kiwi sightings as close as Kaukapakapa and there are plans for Kiwi translocation in Coatesville. Dairy Flat and Waitoki areas are the missing link for a safe passage for Kiwi and other native birds like Kaka.

## **Our Goals**

We aim to eradicate possums, mustelids, rats, and mice within a designated Dairy Flat and Waitoki area.

## **How Will We Achieve This?**

We have registered PFDF as a charity and are working with other groups like Pest Free Coatesville, Pest Free Wrights Road, DOC, and Auckland Council to combine our efforts and gather ideas.

We are open to collaborating with any groups with similar objectives.

We have access to traps (at a cost) and advice, but we need volunteers and funds.

With help from the community, we aim to deploy various traps around Dairy Flat and Waitoki area to significantly reduce pest numbers. Realistically, this will take time and lots of hands-on effort.

Here's how you can help as a volunteer:

- Install, clear traps and keep record of what you catch: On your land and/or in designated locations. We need to trap all of Dairy Flat and Waitoki because leaving gaps will provide safe havens for pests. Knowing how many rats, possums or mustelids we catch will help us with funding.
- Buy traps: Some traps are affordable, while others are sophisticated and expensive. We can help you to choose the suitable option for your land.
- Fundraising ideas: We plan to approach local companies for grants and financial support, but nobody knows the local community as well as you do. Please share your thoughts about businesses who deeply care about the environment and would like to be involved.
- Manage the effort: There will be many tasks along the way we need all the help we can get. Not
  everyone needs to be involved in catching predators. There are many organisational tasks that
  need doing like bringing our flyers to your workplace or school.
- Spread the word: We need everyone in the community to get involved in some capacity to make this work. Use your contacts!

## Who Are 'We'?

So far, we are three people: Roberta, Ann-Marie, and Olaf. We're passionate about the environment and want to see kaka and kiwi back in Dairy Flat and Waitoki. Imagine bellbirds, saddlebacks, and stitchbirds visiting our backyards.

But now 'we' needs to include you! We need everyone to help in whatever way they can, so please get in touch and support us in making Dairy Flat and Waitoki safe for native birds again.

We will be having an initial meeting to kick off the work at 7pm on 30th October in Dairy Flat Village Hall. Put it in your diaries and come along to hear more.

## Update from Louise Johnston, Rodney Local Board member

This last quarter has been very busy for the Dairy Flat subdivision, especially on the planning front. Hopefully, this article is not too long, but there is a lot to cover. Please let me know if there is too much Council speak below or if you require further explanation etc.

## **Surf Park, Data Centre and Solar Farm:**

Last month, the Surf Park, Data Centre, and Solar farm were consented under the COVID-19 fast-track legislation. The location of the 43-hectare Surf Park site is the old dairy farm at 1350 Dairy Flat Highway. The Surf Park development will consist of a surfing lagoon, outdoor pool, wellness retreat, and visitor accommodation comprising a three-story boutique lodge with 409 accommodation units, a restaurant, a 3-hectare data centre, and a 7-hectare solar farm, walking and cycling tracks. The excess heat from the data centre will warm the water in the surfing lagoon so that in winter, it is 18 C and over 24 degrees in summer. As part of the consent conditions, there will be extensive landscaping and planting along the roadside and the stream banks. A shuttle bus will run between the Surf Park and the Park and Ride at Silverdale. A new right-hand turning bay on Dairy Flat Highway will be constructed along with adjacent footpaths. The site has road frontages on Dairy Flat Highway and Postman's Road. I understand the data centre will be accessed from Postman's Road. This whole area was earmarked by the Council for future heavy industry. I believe that this well-planned development with a rural aesthetic will be a huge uplift to the area. Hopefully, it will be an end to anymore of the haphazard, ad hoc container and construction yards being consented. Earthworks for the Surf Park are due to start this summer.

## Fletchers and Fulton Hogan's Private Plan Change:

Urban development can occur in Future Urban areas in several ways. These include a council-initiated Unitary Plan Change, a developer-initiated private unitary plan change, a resource consent, or Government fast-track consenting.

Fletcher's and Fulton Hogan have recently lodged a private Unitary Plan change (PPC 103) with the Council to rezone approximately 107 hectares of land in Dairy Flat from Future Urban to Light Industry. The land subject to the plan change is located south of the Silverdale motorway interchange between State Highway 1 to the east and Dairy Flat Highway to the west and extends to the south to approximately halfway to Wilks Road. The PPC 103 includes landscape buffers along both SH1 and Dairy Flat Highway, stream and wetland plantings, walking and cycling infrastructure, new roads within the proposed industrial area and upgrades to intersections along Dairy Flat Highway. However, there are several waste and water constraints, and temporary solutions are proposed if there is no capacity at the Army Bay treatment plant when the staged development is ready. On the wider integrated transport front, the PPC does not propose any upgrades to the Silverdale interchange and no upgrades to the public transport network. Given that the bus service along Dairy Flat Highway from the Silverdale Park n Ride is not even an hourly service, it might be a struggle for workers to use the bus to get to work. Unfortunately, you can't walk or cycle from Silverdale Park and Ride to Dairy Flat. All the supporting information on PPC 103, including a link to make a submission online, can be found by searching 'Auckland Council Plan Change 103'.

Submissions close: at midnight on 9 August 2024 alternatively, you can email your submission to unitaryplan@aucklandcouncil.govt.nz

Submitters will have the opportunity to present their feedback to an independent hearing panel, the panel will ultimately decide whether this PPC is successful.

It's important that locals provide feedback on this plan change, as we need to help shape the development of our area.

There are also two other large out-of-sequence Private Plan Changes with Council planners for the Dairy Flat subdivision. These plan changes are for high-density urban housing next to Milldale. Due to infrastructure constraints, Council were not planning to develop these areas until after 2050. Another developer behind Ara Hills is also planning to lodge a large housing development under the new fast-track consenting legislation. I am very concerned that if all these housing developments go ahead, Dairy Flat Highway and the Silverdale interchange will be gridlocked! Unplanned urban sprawl without the necessary infrastructure is not the way to grow Auckland!

## **Update on the Notice of Requirements hearing:**

As part of the planning for the urbanisation of Dairy Flat, the Supporting Growth Alliance (Auckland Transport/Waka Kotahi and Council) has lodged 13 Notice of Requirements (NoR) with the Auckland Council for Dairy Flat. NoR's designate an area of land for a particular purpose, such as a road and are a form of route protection.

There were 430 public submissions received on the NoRs for Dairy Flat. The independent public hearing was held from late June to early July. 38 submitters presented to the hearing panel. The submitters were both home and business owners. The Supporting Growth Alliance now has a right of reply, which is due on the 9th of August. It is expected that the independent hearing panel will return a recommendation by the end of the year.

The Council will then recommend to the requiring authority (AT and Waka Kotahi) whether it thinks the designation should be confirmed in the unitary plan (with or without modification to the conditions) or be withdrawn Council and submitters may appeal this decision to the Environment Court.

NoR 4: State Highway 1 Improvements – Albany to Ōrewa and Alterations to Existing Designations 6751, 6760, 6759, 6761

NoR 5: New State Highway 1 Crossing at Dairy Stream

NoR 6: New Connection between Milldale and Grand Drive, Ōrewa

NoR 7: Upgrade to Pine Valley Road

NoR 8: Upgrade to Dairy Flat Highway between Silverdale and Dairy Flat

NoR 9: Upgrade to Dairy Flat Highway between Dairy Flat and Albany

NoR 10: Upgrade to Wainui Road

NoR 11: New Connection between Dairy Flat Highway and Wilks Road

NoR 12: Upgrade and Extension to Bawden Road

NoR13: Upgrade to East Coast Road between Silverdale and Redvale

## **Update on our rural roads:**

As part of Auckland Transport's 10-year budget, funding has significantly increased for both our sealed and unsealed road networks. For the unsealed road improvement program, 124 million has been allocated over the next ten years. The unsealed road improvement program for the next two years is now up on the Auckland Transport website and includes several roads in the Dairy Flat subdivision, such as Turley, Tender, Blackbridge and Gervin Road. Lastly, as we head towards a wetter period, that means more potholes, so please remember to report these to Auckland Transport via <a href="https://at.govt.nz/about-us/contact-us/">https://at.govt.nz/about-us/contact-us/</a>, or if there is a safety risk, please call AT on 09 355 3553. Complaining does work!!!!

## **Changes to Local Board representation:**

Auckland Council must review representation arrangements every six years to ensure they are fair and effective.

As part of this review Council are seeking feedback on the proposal for the Rodney Local board to have two new rural subdivisions. This will not impact residents living in the Dairy Flat Subdivision. However, under the proposal for the Kumeu Subdivision, this be reduced from 4 members to 2 members, Warkworth from 3 members to 2 members, and Wellsford will no longer be a separate subdivision. There will be two new subdivisions created for North and South Rural. The number of overall subdivision members will not change and will remain at nine members.

While this is a very dry subject, it is important because Local Boards now have greater powers and can sell and buy community assets such as parks and halls, defer maintenance, etc. so we need to ensure we have good quality candidates standing for election. ## **Pest Free Dairy Flat:**

Please come to the inaugural **Pest Free Dairy Flat community meeting on October 30th at 7 p.m. at the Dairy Flat Hall, Postman's Road**. Pest Free Coatesville has seen fantastic results with its trapping, and Dairy Flat is the missing link.

## Our 154 Hectare Park at Green Road Dairy Flat:

Since the last Dairy Flat newsletter, we have extended the car park to accommodate more vehicles, including horse floats.

We have just over 600K allocated for building two bridges in the park and a section of the gravel pathways. The entrance from Sunnyside Road will be via a new culvert pipe, which is on-site but will only be installed once the weather improves. Construction of the gravel paths has started; however, we do not have the funding to complete all the tracks but there will be one all-weather loop completed with the existing funding.

For the Penlink offset mitigation planting, fencing should go up later this year, and planting will start in the next planting season. This includes both wetland planting and riparian planting. This is a massive win for Green Road.

Also, the Council has secured growth funding for a park toilet and bore, which will be delivered next financial year.

We have also started a Friends of Green Road group, and we are meeting this week to formalise a strategic plan for the group and establish an incorporated society. The incorporated society will be an important advocate for the park going forward and a fundraising vehicle, especially for completing the pathways network and feature tree planting, etc. Please let me know if you want to get involved even if it is just to stay updated.

## <u>Deadline for assistance for properties severely impacted by Anniversary weekend</u> floods:

Lastly, if the flood events severely impacted you on the Anniversary weekend of 2023, you only have until 30 September to opt into the voluntary Council buy-out scheme. Council is very concerned that many high-risk property owners have not opted into this scheme, and if there is another extreme weather event, they will be at risk. Going forward, there is no guarantee that the insurance companies will continue to cover high-risk properties, and this is an opportunity to ensure you are not in this situation. 


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
